

CLASS I

In Class 1 we have been learning about preparing fruits. We have thought about the different ways that fruit needs to be prepared; by washing, peeling with our hands or a peeler, and by cutting - some fruit needs more than one method of preparation. In class we have practiced each of these methods of preparation and then tasted the fruit we had prepared evaluating the taste and texture. We tried melon, pineapple, grapes, strawberries, lemon, lime, apple, kiwi, persimmon, mango, orange, and banana. Next, we will be using our evaluations to help us design our own fruit kebabs!
